Dear CSL community,

As we reflect on Summer 2025, we are filled with gratitude and excitement for Camp Seneca Lake's future. This summer was a powerful affirmation of what makes CSL special, a joyful Jewish environment where campers and staff grow, connect, and thrive.

We're thrilled to report another year of strong enrollment and even stronger impact. In just two years, we have grown enrollment by more than 35%. Feedback from campers, parents, and staff shows that CSL continues to deliver a transformational summer experience. Our programming deepened, our Jewish and Israel education evolved in meaningful ways, and camper wellbeing remained central to everything we did.

This summer also tested us in unexpected ways. In April, a microburst, the most destructive windstorm in CSL's recent memory, tore through the camp property, toppling hundreds of trees and damaging several buildings. In the face of this challenge, our community rallied. Alumni, families, staff, and supporters stepped up with their time, expertise, and donations, helping us clear debris, fix damaged spaces, and restore camp to be safe and fully operational before Opening Day. It was a powerful reminder of the resilience of the CSL community and how deeply people believe in CSL's mission.

This report highlights key milestones from the past year, including the launch and early implementation of our Strategic Plan and the first summer of the Max and Marian Farash Charitable Foundation's Project Campfire initiative, which brought even more campers to CSL and helped us take significant steps toward greater financial accessibility.

None of this would be possible without the collective energy of the CSL community. Whether you joined us as a camper, staff member, parent, donor, or leader, your role in CSL's success is deeply valued. Together, we are strengthening our community, one that ensures Camp Seneca Lake remains a home for Jewish connection, identity, and leadership for generations to come.

Summer **Highlights**

We accelerated camper enrollment growth

- ⛵ 352 camper session **enrollments**
- ⛵ 136 **new campers**, compared to 108 in 2024 and 66 in 2023
- ⛵ **37% increase** in overall camper enrollment over the last 2 years

While enrollment numbers were already on the rise, the trend was accelerated by the Max and Marian Farash Charitable Foundation's transformative [Project Campfire](#) initiative. This initiative made one session at camp tuition-free to families from the Rochester area. Thanks to the generosity of our donors, CSL was able to distribute over \$100,000 of internal financial aid to families from our other communities. This was supported by our scholarship funds at the JCC, as well as the Mike Nozik Memorial Scholarship Fund and the Chance at Camp Fund at the Jewish Federation of Greater Rochester.



We improved our program around key focus areas

- ⛵ We enhanced our **Jewish arts programming** thanks to the generous support of the Sharon Norry Hiddur Mitzvah Fund, and brought famed Israeli artist Hanoch Piven to camp for a series of workshops with campers, with the support of the Foundation for Jewish Camp.
- ⛵ A streamlined and simplified **summer schedule** reduced the number of arrival and departure dates and returned our Senior Camper program to a full summer program.
- ⛵ Campers built skills and confidence through **enhanced Hobby offerings** such as Kitchen Confidential (cooking), Podcast Journalism, Ceramics, Sailing.
- ⛵ Our new **Taste of CSL** program, a one-week option for rising third and fourth graders, allowed 30 first-time campers to experience the best of camp in a highly curated, abbreviated session, that left them excited to become lifelong campers!

What we're hearing from **our families...**

CSL participates annually in the Camper Satisfaction Index survey which benchmarks our camp against 60+ other Jewish camps nationally. We scored above the national average in nearly every category measured!

96% of our families say they are likely to recommend CSL to other families.

90% of families are likely or extremely likely to return to CSL.

97% of families say the camp environment helped their child grow.

95% of families expressed positivity about CSL's programming.

95% of families said that CSL helped their child build character.

"Our family has definitely become a camp family after our two kids attended CSL this past summer. Both kids had the time of their lives, trying all kinds of new things, learning new songs, and creating memories. 

90% of our staff said that working at camp increased their ability to work as a part of a team.

92% of staff said they had opportunities to develop new skills.

Jewish Experience and Israel Engagement

CSL continued to center Jewish joy and provide a safe space where it was great to be Jewish—whatever that means or looks like to each member of our community. Shabbat services and Havdalah at our lakefront Fire Circle remained quintessential parts of the CSL experience. A generous gift from the Miller family bolstered our Jewish music program, allowing our songleaders to engage in pre-summer training at Hava Nashira and return with the skills to take CSL's Jewish music to another level. Community partners were integrated into the Jewish life program, with rabbis and educators from many of our local communities engaging with campers throughout the summer. **Take a peak at Jewish life at CSL in 2025!**

96% of families said that CSL created an appreciation for the celebration of Shabbat.

95% of our families said CSL created an atmosphere where their child was proud to be Jewish.

94% of families said that CSL created an inclusive and protective space free from antisemitism.

95% of families said that CSL strengthened their child's relationships with Israelis.

91% of our staff, the majority of whom return to college campuses in the fall, said that working at camp had an overall positive impact on their Jewish identity.



Arts at CSL

The CSL Arts program reached new heights in 2025. The support of the Sharon Norry Hiddur Mitzvah Fund allowed the hiring of a specialist in Jewish arts from Israel. She joined a team which already featured 4 experienced arts specialists, each with at least 3 years on CSL's staff. Each village created a special Jewish art project, in addition to our existing opportunities to engage in ceramics and other visual arts.

"The arts program is more than just teaching techniques. It's about giving kids a new language to express their inner world. Every day, we cultivate a space where creativity and fun can grow. Performing arts also expanded in 2025. More campers performed in Campstock, had the opportunity to lead a song at Shabbat services, and participate in Theater Hobby Group to put on a special play.



Athletics at CSL

Athletics at CSL benefitted from a stronger emphasis on skill-building, and a highly experienced team, including a credentialed, full-time Physical Education teacher running the program. Campers received helpful and effective instruction in their sports of choice.

"The Athletics program this past summer was an extremely successful beginning to a new form of programming at CSL. Doing more skills-based instruction led to direct results in camper ability and enjoyment. The bonds created between campers at Athletics will be bonds that can never be broken. As a Physical Education teacher, I can only hope that my curriculum is as successful as CSL's."

Camper Wellbeing and Safety

The **physical and mental health** of campers is always a top priority at CSL.

"I had the pleasure of returning this past summer - 22 years after my last summer at camp. Parents, campers and staff were gracious and kind as we worked together to keep kids safe, healthy, and in good spirits. I thought my years of having a transformative summer at CSL were long gone, but I was mistaken. It turns out you can go 'home' again."

Em's Place remained the hub of mental health and wellness, including 52 yoga periods, relaxation space for campers or cabins having a tough day, and space for campers and staff to take 65 private telehealth therapy calls. The daily use of the space proved critical to the mental wellbeing of our campers and staff. Em's Place was staffed by Camper Care Director Rhonda Korn, in her 13th summer on CSL's Camper Care Team, supported by a Camper Care Specialist.



95% of families said CSL provided a safe, healthy, and secure environment for their child.

Various **security upgrades** were made in the past year, including investment in our communications infrastructure to aid in emergency response. The property was guarded overnight, as we continued to invest in camp's security.

96% of parents said CSL provided their child with a sense of safety and belonging.



Alumni Engagement
